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Pursuing the sport of kings

Modern falconers keep ancient traditions alive

Falconry, or the art of hunting with trained birds, was ancient already when it was adopted by European royalty in the middle ages. According to some reports the practice originated more than 3,000 years ago – in Central Asia – before spreading throughout the region and then the world. Other accounts place falconry as far back as 2,000 BC in Mesopotamia, though there are questions

about the validity of that origin. Still others trace is to Mongolia or the Iranian plateau. We do know that by 680 BC Chinese records were describing the practice, and that Aristotle described practices similar to falconry among the young men of Thrace. Wherever and whenever it originated, it eventually became widely practiced in the Middle East, where it's still a popular sport today. It was from there, Gerald Dyson explained, that many western Europeans were exposed (or reintroduced) to the practice during the Crusades. Dyson, a professor of history at Kentucky Christian University (KCU), said that while falconry in Europe and elsewhere was often associated with the nobility –

Severe storms last week caused local waterways to swell and creeks to overflow their banks across the county on Wednesday morning. Meatball mania: Celebrating National Meatball Day!

Roll out the red (sauce) carpet, because it's that time of the year again -- National Meatball Day is upon us! This coming Saturday, March 9, 2024, we commemorate the humble meatball.

The meatball stands as a beacon of convenience, flavor and thriftiness in the kitchen. From ancient Chinese recipes to Arabic delights and Roman feasts, meatballs have graced tables across civilizations for millennia, each culture adding its own unique twist.

Whether nestled in a bed of spaghetti or adorning a sub sandwich, let's dive into the delightful

world of DIY meatballs. This recipe can utilize any ground meat that happens to be on sale this week, making it budget friendly and flexible. You can vary the seasoning to complement your sauce of choice.

VERY VERSATILE HOME-MADE MEATBALLS

Yield: 4 to 5 servings
Total Time: 22 to 35 minutes

1 pound ground meat (beef, pork, turkey, chicken, sausage or combination)
1/2 cup seasoned breadcrumbs
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1/4 cup milk
1 large egg
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 teaspoon dried Italian seasoning (or another seasoning blend)
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
Olive oil (for cooking)

Preheat your oven to 375 F (190 C). Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or lightly grease it with olive oil.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the ground meat, breadcrumbs, Parmesan cheese, milk, egg, minced garlic, Italian seasoning, salt and black pepper. Use your hands or a spoon to mix until well combined. Be

careful not to overmix, as this can result in tough meatballs.

Shape the meat mixture into meatballs about 1 to 1.5 inches in diameter. Place them on the prepared baking sheet, evenly spaced apart.

If baking, lightly brush or spray the meatballs with olive oil to help them brown and crisp up in the oven. Alternatively, if frying, heat a large skillet over medium heat and add a tablespoon of olive oil.

If baking, bake the meatballs in the preheated oven for 20-25 minutes, or until cooked through and browned on the outside. If frying, cook the meatballs in batches, turning occasionally, until browned on all sides and cooked through, about 10-12 minutes.

Once cooked, remove the meatballs from the oven or skillet and let them rest for a few minutes before serving.

Serve the meatballs hot with your choice of sauce. They pair well with marinara sauce, barbecue sauce, creamy Alfredo sauce, sweet and sour sauce or any other favorite sauce of yours.

Freezing meatballs is a smart way to save time and ensure you always have a delicious meal on hand. Once cooked, cool the meatballs completely, then transfer them to a freezer-safe

Mansfield's Bar

What and where is Mansfield's Bar? Mansfield's Bar is not some gin mill, where liquor flows. Nor is Mansfield's Bar an immobile, fixed location. Instead, Mansfield's Bar is everywhere and always on the move. Next time y'all are driving behind a semi on some interstate, y'all might notice a T-shaped bar welded to the back of the semi's trailer. It's called a "Mansfield bar" or an "override guard," and it prevents your car from running-up underneath the semi's trailer.

But why do we call this "override guard," mandated by federal regulations a "Mansfield Bar?" Actress Jane Mansfield, that's why. June 29, 1967, 2:25 a.m.: Actress Jane Mansfield died a gruesome death on a lonely Louisiana country road, when her 1966 Buick Electra rear-ended a semi-tractor without an override guard. Mansfield's car ran clear-up underneath that semi-tractor. Legend says the impact decapitated Mansfield. Not true.

Coroner's report said the impact peeled-back Mansfield's scalp and ripped-out the front of her brain with it—a gruesome death.

By now, you'll all be asking, "What does this have to do with the Bible?" Answer: Plenty. So please, keep reading... Shortly before Mansfield died that gruesome death, she embarked on highly publicized and, some say, torrid tryst with Anton LaVey. Many photos of the iniquitous pair ran in magazines of the day.

Who was Anton LaVey? He founded San Francisco's Satanic Church of, wrote the "Satanic Bible," and performed the first "Satanic baptism" on his own daughter, then just three years old. Both LaVey and Mansfield craved publicity. To satisfy their cravings, both LaVey and Mansfield publicly defied God, and dared Him to answer. But answer God did, when at 2:25 a.m., June 29, 1967, He cast Jane Mansfield, who chose to be the devil's harlot, into a devil's Hell. God says, "The candle of the wicked shall be put out." (Proverbs

24:20). He warns that "the wicked shall be turned into hell." (Psalms 9:17).

Differently put, the Lord God Almighty does not jack around, folks. And if folks wanna jack around with Him, folks are going to find out—just like Jane Mansfield found out—Jesus does not jack around. Jesus means exactly what He says: "The wages of sin is death." (Romans 6:23). And when The Lord Jesus Christ says "death," He means a forever death in a devil's Hell. (Revelation 2:11; 20:6, 14). If asked about Jane Mansfield's death, the Lord Jesus would say:

Suppose ye that [she] w[as] [a] sinner above all ... because [she] suffered such things? I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish. (Luke 13:2-3).

One needn't bed-down with a devil worshipper to end up in a devil's hell. One need only love this present world more than one loves Him, (Matthew 7:21), Who gave Himself for us. (Titus 2:14). Lest ye too perish as Jane Mansfield perished, "examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith," (II Corinthians 13:5), the next time y'all pass Mansfield's Bar.

Don't forget sprayer maintenance during spring cleaning

Remember to include sprayer maintenance in your spring-cleaning tasks. It will ensure that your spray equipment is ready for the planting season and save you time and money down the road.

Taking care of sprayer maintenance prior to the hectic growing season can prevent time-consuming equipment breakdowns, higher chemical costs, reduced pesticide effectiveness and potential crop damage.

Poorly maintained sprayers can cause variations in pesticide application rates. These variations can lead to ineffective pest control and potential crop injury, resulting in higher chemical costs and reduced

profits. Precise pesticide application is even more important with the highly active agricultural chemicals we have on the market today.

Make the following a part of your spray equipment cleaning chore:

- Rinse out the sprayer to remove any dirt that accumulated over the winter.
- Check the pump for excessive wear and to be sure it is operating at full capacity.
- Inspect sprayer lines for leaks.
- Visually inspect nozzles for excessive wear, corrosion or damage.
- Measure the output from each nozzle to ensure uniform application.

- Visually inspect spray from each nozzle to find any inconsistent patterns resulting from wear or damage.
- Clean filter screens and replace worn ones.
- Check the agitator for proper turbulence to ensure specific formulations are well mixed.
- On a driveway or other appropriate site, use water to check spray patterns for proper overlap.
- Inspect electrical connections on sprayer controllers for corroded or loose wires.

Legislative update

FRANKFORT- Within the hallowed halls of the Kentucky General Assembly, where the whispers of our history blend seamlessly with the dreams of tomorrow, I stand humbled to serve as a guardian of our commonwealth's future. As we navigate the complex maze of governance, I invite you to join me in a moment of reflection on our collective journey and the path that stretches before us. In the arena of legislative debate, the essence of our collective path forward is continually refined and defined. A highlight of SB 1 is its provision for the Kentucky Spinal Cord and Head Injury Research Trust as one of the initial five consortiums, focusing on groundbreaking research in spinal and head injuries. This initiative, receiving near-unanimous support, stands as a clear declaration of furthering our pursuit of knowledge and the enhancement of our people.

Likewise, **Senate Bill (SB) 198**, the product of the Nuclear Energy Task Force which I was selected to serve on as one of two Senate members this past year, heralds a new chapter in our quest for energy independence and sustainability. My heartfelt thanks go to Senator Danny Carroll (R-Benton) for his pivotal role in the Nuclear Development Task Force, a collaborative endeavor that has culminated in this groundbreaking initiative. With unanimous support, SB 198 reflects our collective commitment to guiding Kentucky's energy destiny.

On a personal note, my **Senate Bill (SB) 101**, of which I am the sponsor, passed the Senate Agriculture committee this week. The bill protects working animals throughout the state from arbitrary ordinance or restriction by allowing working animal activities from the Kentucky State Fair and North American Livestock Show in Louisville to rural events. Activities include but are not limited to dog shows, field trials, carriage horses, racing

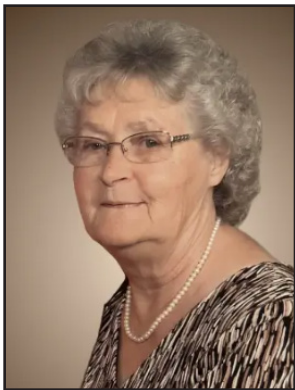

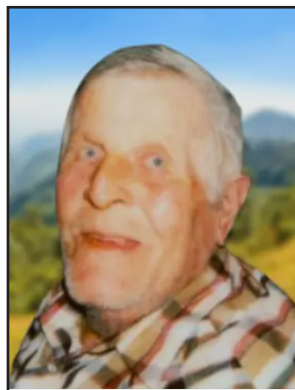

HB 500 is a bad idea

If a small group of legislators in Frankfort have their way, working class Kentuckians could lose a number of the work-place protections they currently enjoy – including guaranteed lunch breaks, regular rest breaks, and overtime pay.

The bill, introduced by Rep. Phillip Pratt (R – Georgetown) would, among other things, eliminate protections for required lunch breaks, rest breaks, and the requirement for time-and-a-half overtime pay for anyone working seven days or more in a row. It would also decrease the statute of limitations for bringing employment related lawsuits from five years to three years.

Pratt, who also sponsored HB 225 which threatens to weaken our state’s child labor laws, claims the bill is an attempt to “modernize” Kentucky labor law. By aligning Kentucky’s minimum protections with those required at the federal level, he claims, employers will be “less confused” about what is required of them. Some, like Pratt, claim this will make it less complicated for new employers to locate in the state.

But labor law attorneys and organized labor groups are skeptical of this claim. Kentucky’s laws, like every other state’s, already have to meet or exceed the minimum federal protections. Employers abiding by the state’s current minimum protections are already exceeding the minimum standards set by the federal government.

And while highly skilled laborers, full time employees, and those with union contracts that already guarantee their protections probably don’t have as much to worry about, those who do need to worry are those who need the protections most; namely part time or temporary contract workers.

Currently, if you work an eight hour shift in Kentucky, your employer is required to give you a half-hour lunch break. They don’t have to compensate workers for that time like they do with other mandated rest breaks, but they do have to offer the break. State law requires that it be offered no sooner than three hours into the shift, and no later than five hours after the start of the shift. Furthermore, the state currently requires at least ten minutes of paid break time for every four hours of time worked.

Kentucky’s laws also currently protect part-time workers from being exploited through scheduling tricks by mandating time-and-a-half pay for anyone working seven or more days in a row without a day off. Pratt’s bill would remove those protections. This means employers could theoretically schedule employees to work part-time every day of the week, without any days off, and as long as their total number of scheduled hours didn’t exceed the federally mandated 40 hours they wouldn’t receive any overtime pay.

As with the lunch breaks and rest breaks, this move is more likely to hurt those who work in service industry jobs with non-standard hours – such as retail and grocery stores, or restaurants – than it is the nine-to-five office worker.

Another provision, which would eliminate employer liability for failure to provide pay for travel and prep time before beginning a job, or for finishing work after the main job completed, is more likely to impact those involved in the trades and related fields. For instance, those working in hazardous environments might not be paid for the considerable time spent gearing up properly before undertaking a task, or for decontamination after the tasks are completed. Likewise, someone working in HVAC or landscaping (Pratt’s business when he isn’t engaged in tearing down worker protections is Pratt’s Lawn and Landscape) might not be able to claim pay for the time spent traveling to and from different job sites throughout the day.

If you have a complaint about unfair practices, the law would also shrink the time you have to act on those labor complaints from five years to three years, reducing the time employees have to report these issues, and bans punitive damages for wrongful dismissal.

These are protections that Kentucky workers have counted on for nearly 50 years now (ironically the law protecting lunch breaks was passed exactly 50 years ago this year, in 1974), and are requirements every company doing business in Kentucky now have gotten used to following. While Pratt claims it would ease confusion for businesses, and that businesses can voluntarily continue following the standards if they find that easier, changing half a century of standards would probably create more confusion for existing businesses than they would ever save new businesses.

More importantly, though, they would hurt workers at a time when inflation is already shrinking the spending power of the average consumer.

There is still some hope, however. While Pratt managed to garner enough votes to bring the bill out of committee – meaning the House will likely vote on it this session – it doesn’t have

What do you do in today’s world when someone asks you to sign an important legal document and you don’t know how to connect all of the letters?

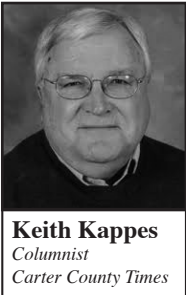

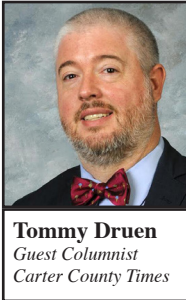
The power of hope

In May of 1992, I graduated 8th grade. That summer I, as I can only assume everyone else my age, became fixated on the televised national conventions of both the Democrats and Republicans. Although neither offered any real intrigue as previous years, my 14-year-old self was fascinated by the speeches, as well as the pomp and circumstance.

While the Democrats’ convention that would ultimately nominate Bill Clinton for President happened 32 years ago, I can still remember some of it vividly. Two things stand apart in my memory. The first is that Governor Mario Cuomo, easily one of the best orators of my lifetime, gave a fantastic speech. The second is that there was an outstanding biographical video regarding Clinton called “The Man From Hope.” Looking back, the 1992 election was fascinating in many ways and, I believe that video played a crucial role in Clinton’s victory a few months later.

While it might have been sheer coincidence that Bill Clinton was born in a town named Hope, his advisors deserve credit for emphasizing that point. For hope, I would argue, is perhaps the most integral of human emotions. Throughout history, we encounter moments that are almost beyond comprehension – pestilence, war, genocide, famine and more. Atrocities like the Holocaust make us question not just how people survived, but why. The answer, time and again, comes back to hope; hope that there would be a brighter future.

In a recent sermon, my pastor, Dr. Patrick DeVane, shared a story about British children orphaned during

the World War II bombings of London by the Nazis. Despite being relocated to refugee camps where their necessities were met and they were showered by love, these children faced difficulties sleeping at night.

Caretakers, determined to comfort them, discovered an unconventional solution: letting the children sleep holding a loaf of bread. It worked miraculously for most of the children. When asked what magic was about the bread, one child explained that they had been able to eat that day and, by holding that loaf, they had hope of eating again the next day. It wasn’t as though the bread was a surrogate stuffed animal, but rather that it symbolized a hope that brought them comfort and provided the ability to rest.

Our world is becoming increasingly critical, and it is noticeable. People complain about the most trivial of matters to the highest arching. Whether it be a forgotten item at a drive-thru or national governmental policies, people are quick to share criticisms. People engage in arguments merely for the fun of arguing, causing many to shy away from the spotlight, eschewing involvement in business, political or civic affairs in order to avoid the relentless criticism and character assassination. Much like the sleepless nights of war-torn London’s children, it is highly understandable.

What people may not realize is the impact of their criticism. Each complaint chips away at the souls of those striving to make our world better. It’s human nature – ninety-nine compliments can be overshadowed by one disparaging remark. Every uttered criticism diminishes the flame of hope, sometimes to the point

interactions was Davis’s unwavering commitment to listen and understand, even in the face of hatred and bigotry.

While many would respond to hate with hate, Davis chose a different path. He listened to Roger Kelly's perspective, his fears, and his beliefs. In doing so, Davis created an environment that fostered genuine dialogue and empathy. Through their conversations, both men discovered that they had more in common than they could have ever imagined.

The power of Davis’s approach became evident when Kelly, once a Grand Wizard of the KKK, renounced his ties to the organization. This profound change of heart led Kelly to symbolically hand over his hood and robe to Davis, an act that signified the transformation from hate to love.

Davis’s impact extends far beyond this single encounter. Astonishingly, he has inspired over 200 Klan members to abandon their racist ideologies and surrender their robes and hoods to him. Through his relentless pursuit of under-

standing and compassion, Davis has become a catalyst for change, replacing hate with love, one person at a time.

As we reflect on Daryl Davis’s extraordinary journey, and our recent Black History Month, we are reminded of the power of love and the potential for unity that exists within each of us. Davis’s unwavering commitment to love and understanding serves as a beacon of hope, reminding us that together, we can turn the tide of this planetary train wreck.

The time for change is now. Let us embrace the lessons from Daryl Davis’s story and work hand in hand to create a world that celebrates our shared humanity. Love, indeed, has the power to conquer hate, every single time.
