These are the sights, sounds, and smells of the county fair, an event that can live for decades in the memories.

This year the Carter County Fair begins on Saturday, August 3, kicking off with the Carter

Beyond the music

Shriners Park epicenter of festivals for a cause

This weekend the Orange Army Bluegrass Festival is coming to the Carter County Shrine Club Show Grounds. That show (story on page 3) helps raise awareness and funds for cancer patients. But it's just the latest event for a good cause to come to the park.

Last weekend the Country on Tygart show brought country music artists to the park for a free concert to support the same cause. While the weekend before

that it was the Shriner's own bluegrass festival – an annual event now in its 33rd year – that drew music fans to the park.

That show raises funds for the Shriners Children's Hospitals; where children can receive treatment for serious illness and disease at no cost to their families.

Carter County Shrine Club president Donald "Ducky" Owens said he's glad to see the Shriner's proven charitable formula being utilized to grow other events, and that the club can provide their venue for those events.

"It's a great space for it," Owens said, noting that the park is available to rent for various events, from weddings to concerts and more.

He said it also creates great

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Thompson indicted for murder in DUI death

Olive Hill woman also charged with assault, wanton endangerment, and DUI

An Olive Hill woman has been indicted on a capital murder charge in a DUI incident that led to the death of Phillip Konopka and the injury of another last year.

The Grand Jury of the Carter Circuit Court returned indictments on July 12, including an indictment for Kristina Thompson, age 51, for her role in the death of Konopka. The indictment alleges that on May 3, 2023, Thompson, "committed the offense of murder by operating

a motor vehicle under circumstances manifesting extreme indifference to human life by being under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs" and while driving intoxicated "causing the death of Phillip Konopka."

The murder charge is a capital offense.

Thompson was also indicted on a charge of assault in the first degree for causing "serious physical injury" to another victim, a Class B felony, and for wanton endangerment, a Class D felony, when she "wantonly engaged in conduct which created a substantial danger of death or serious physical injury" to a third individual.

A fourth charge of operating a motor vehicle under the influence is classified as a Class B misdemeanor.

Other indictments issued by the Grand Jury include the following:

- Clifford Carter, 34, of Grayson, on or about February 18, 2024, committed the offenses of wanton endangerment, first degree, by wantonly engaging in conduct which created a substantial danger of death or serious physical injury to another, a Class D felony; and endangering the welfare of a minor, by selling drugs within the residence creating substantial risk of physical or emotional injury, a Class A misdemeanor.

- Carolann George, 33, of West Liberty, on or about April 9, 2024, committed the offense of theft by unlawful taking, when she stole ten \$100 gift card from a lock box, \$30 in cash out of a desk, one of the victim's back door keys, and a lock box key, as well as keys to the entire building, with intent to deprive the victim thereof, a Class D felony.

Reinventing leftovers: Turn your suppertime surplus into a savory galette

In a world where food waste is a growing concern, finding creative ways to use leftovers can be both economical and exciting. Imagine transforming yesterday's dinner into a delightful new dish with a flaky, buttery crust that elevates even the simplest ingredients. Welcome to the magic of the galette -- a French culinary gem that will make your leftovers the star of a new meal.

In French, "galette" is a term used to describe various freeform pies made with only a bottom crust. Traditionally, these can

be sweet or savory, often filled with eggs, vegetables or fruit. A galette is a perfect way to creatively use up leftovers, like all the little bits and pieces in the fridge. Not only does this technique help reduce food waste, but it also brings a touch of elegance to your table. And let's face it, everything tastes better with a flaky, buttery crust.

A standard (9-inch) pie crust holds about 3 cups of filling, using whatever you have in the fridge. For example, you could use 2 cups cooked chicken and 1 cup mushrooms; or 1 cup hamburger, 1 cup beans and 1 cup corn; or 2 cups mixed vegetables and 1 cup diced ham. You get the idea.

You can make your own pie pastry, but purchasing ready-made pie crusts is perfectly fine.

Here's how you can effortlessly transform your leftovers into a mouthwatering galette:

LEFTOVER GALETTE

- Yield: 4 Servings
Total Time: 35 minutes
- 3 *tablespoons butter or olive oil*
 - 1 *small onion, diced*
 - 3 *garlic cloves, minced*
 - 3 *cups cooked leftover meat and vegetables*

- 3 *tablespoons all-purpose flour*
 - 1 *cup chicken broth or milk*
 - 1 *tablespoon parsley or Italian seasoning*
 - 1/2 *teaspoon salt*
 - 1/4 *teaspoon pepper*
 - 1/2 *cup shredded cheese, optional*
- One (9-inch) pie crust, purchased or homemade

Heat the butter in a large skillet and saute the onion until translucent. Add the garlic and up to 3 cups of mixed leftovers to the skillet to warm.

Sprinkle the warmed filling with flour, stirring to evenly distribute. Let this cook for 2 minutes. Add 1 cup liquid (milk, half and half, cream or broth), the parsley or Italian seasoning, and adjust salt and pepper to taste. Stir to mix well. Bring to a simmer, then remove from heat and set aside. The filling will thicken as it cools.

Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 400 F. On a floured parchment sheet, roll dough into a 12-inch circle. Transfer to a baking sheet.

Place the cooled filling in the center, leaving about a 2-inch border on the sides. Sprinkle with cheese if desired. Pull the sides of the pastry up over the filling, pinching at intervals to

secure the pastry, leaving the center open.

Bake for 20 to 25 minutes, or until the crust is golden.

In the photo, I used shredded chicken breast, purple onion, sliced mushrooms, canned artichoke hearts and a big handful of chopped fresh spinach. Then I added a little cream and Parmesan cheese along with chicken broth to make a creamy sauce. The beauty of this recipe is its versatility -- you can use whatever leftovers you have on hand. Each galette will be a unique culinary adventure.

Transforming leftovers into a galette not only helps you

save money but also reduces food waste and adds a gourmet twist to your meal planning. So next time you open your fridge to a collection of mismatched leftovers, remember this simple yet sophisticated technique. Your taste buds -- and your wallet -- will thank you.

Blessed assurance

Fanny Crosby was a prolific Christian songwriter who wrote over 8,000 hymns during her lifetime. She was born in New York on March 24, 1820, into a family with a strong Puritan heritage. As an infant, she suffered an eye infection that left her blind for life.

In the summer of 1873, Crosby visited her friend, Phoebe Knapp, who was a gifted musician and composer. One day, Knapp played a melody on her piano and asked Crosby what she thought of it. As soon as Crosby heard the tune, she exclaimed, "Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine!" and began to compose the lyrics on the spot. Within an hour, the hymn was complete, and Blessed Assurance was born.

The lyrics of Blessed

Assurance are a powerful incredible testimony to Fanny Crosby's faith in Jesus Christ and her unwavering confidence in His salvation. The opening lines declare, "Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine! Oh, what a foretaste of glory divine!" The hymn goes on to affirm the believer's security in Christ, their victory over sin and death, and their hope of eternal life.

We are all on a journey in this life and we all have an incredible story of where we have come from and where we are going. The journey will be much easier when we keep our "eyes" on Jesus.

There's no doubt that the "dash" called life will be tested and tried. It will make us or break us. Fanny made a choice to turn each of her difficulties over to the Lord. She became a woman of astounding faith.

Her faith in an unwavering Lord with all her heart was filled with many challenges, I am sure. Out of her difficulties came a wonderful hymn within an hour that has been a great encouragement to thousands for a hundred and fifty-one years.

The ultimate victory in our stories will come from relying totally on the truth from the Word of God. We don't deny the "facts" of what we are facing or going through. However, we need to know what the "truth" of the matter is.

Jesus said in John 14:6 "I am the way, the truth, and the life."

Some days we may feel like a warrior, and we are winning the battle no matter what comes our way. Other days we may feel like a broken mess. But no matter what, we talk to the Savior with childlike faith. Trusting and believing and

standing on His promises. The promises that will not fail.

However, the story behind Blessed Assurance is more than just a moment of inspiration and musical genius. Crosby's blindness, while a physical limitation, never hindered her ability to see and experience the beauty and majesty of God's love. Her powerful testimony reminds us of the Bible verse, "we walk by faith, not by sight" (2 Corinthians 5:7).

God's promise that "I will never leave you nor forsake you" is found in multiple books of the Bible, in both the Old and New Testaments. With these promises, we are as-

sured He is with us always.

Charles Spurgeon once said, "You would not pray if you did not have trouble. It is a blessing to be stung to your Father's feet. My dear friend, when grief presses you to the dust, worship there. It is a blessed thing when the waves of affliction wash us upon the rock of confidence in God alone."

Your story is important to walk it out in faith, hope and love. God does not waste anything, test or trial, in our lives. Keep the faith and stay close to the Lord. He is your strength, and your health. Get into the scriptures and glean from every promise that is for you. Jesus knows all

Pond turnover could be why the fish in your pond are dying

Each summer through the early fall, we get questions from landowners searching for reasons why fish are dying in their ponds. Pond turnover is often the answer.

During the summer months, water can become stagnant and stratify, which means it separates into distinct layers of cool and warm water. This occurs because the sun only penetrates the water closest to the surface. Since the sun is unable to penetrate to the water at deeper depths, that water stays cooler. These waters will start to mix when cooler air temperatures begin to arrive and cool the surface water. Heavy rains or strong winds can mix pond water too. This mixing process is called pond turnover.

When the water from the lower depths of the pond reaches the surface, it may not be as oxygenated as the previous surface water. This is because water in the bottom of the pond may have a higher

organic matter content and fewer oxygen producing plants. Fish need dissolved oxygen to live. This water may also contain gases, such as hydrogen sulfide, which are toxic to fish. When turnover occurs, it can cause an algal bloom die-off, a fish kill due to low dissolved oxygen or both.

Turnover usually only occurs during the warmer months of the year. Late fall, winter and early spring typically have lower

surface water temperatures, and wind and rain help pond waters stay well mixed and maintain a more uniform temperature.

People will build commercial fish production ponds at shallower depths to prevent pond turnover. For existing ponds, the only way to prevent turnover is to install a system that mechanically aerates or mixes the pond and circulates the water from spring through fall. However, these systems are often expensive.

If you have dead fish in

community energy to have these other events at the park, and that he hopes the Shriner's annual bluegrass show can serve as a cornerstone and anchor for preserving and advancing our local music traditions, including these other bluegrass festivals and shows, while advancing these worthy causes.

Newspapers are still a great way to reach your audience

Someone asked me recently what they could do to help the newspaper.

I was discussing my struggles with selling ads. I am a writer, not a salesperson, and though I know the value of our paper and how it could help businesses reach customers – our website got nearly 9,000 hits the week in question, in addition to the 1,000 papers we have printed each week – I sometimes have a hard time getting that idea across.

There is this idea among businesses that newspapers are antiquated. That it's a dying industry. That it just isn't worth the investment for your advertising dollars.

And while it's true that print sales are shrinking, people don't quite grasp that the newspaper is more than the paper it's printed on. It's the content, and that content in the modern world can be accessed in multiple ways – from your smartphone; your laptop; or the good, old-fashioned print newspaper that comes in your mailbox.

Often folks will tell me they get all their news on the phone. Then they'll point out a local news story, written by us, scraped from the web by a news aggregator, and repackaged for them. The fact that they wouldn't have this "free" content without all our work behind the scenes is completely lost on them.

So, when someone asks me what the newspaper needs from them, the truth is, we need what all the other businesses in our community need. We need folks to be more locally minded with how they spend their money.

Not just you, the readers, who pick up our local newspaper (thank you for your support!) and shop from local retailers. But also, the businesses who want to draw in those shoppers.

If a business wants to draw local shoppers, they need to advertise locally.

While a business who advertises in a larger, regional publication might get a few people who come into town from Ashland or Morehead, for the most part those folks have plenty of shopping and entertainment options closer to home.

It isn't a bad idea to engage with those folks. But it's also a good idea to remind those thousands of eyes – the ones who view stories in our print and online edition each week – that you're still here too. Many of them may be walking or driving past your business on a regular basis without ever stopping by.

Every advertisement that goes into our physical paper can also be placed online too. Not only that, but online ads can include links directly to your website or social media presence. However you choose to engage with customers online, the newspaper can help you do that.

We'll write a story too. If you have an event, and it's newsworthy, we're going to make sure it receives the proper coverage. If you're a new business, and you want the community to know that you've opened, we'll gladly run the ribbon cutting photos. We're even glad to have a reporter stop by and talk to you about your journey from concept to business.

It's why we're here.

We didn't start a newspaper because we expected to get rich – I've been a writer for way too long to ever have such delusions. We did it because the community deserved a reliable news source. One with reporters in the community, regularly covering local events and government meetings. And we were positioned to be able to provide that.

But if the community values that, and the services provided by other local businesses, they need to show their support.

Shop with our locally owned stores instead of making the trip to the big-box store in a neighboring county. Eat at a locally owned restaurant. Sign your kid up for dance or tumbling lessons at a local studio. Continue to pick up this newspaper from the newsstand and, if you want to be sure you never miss an issue, subscribe.

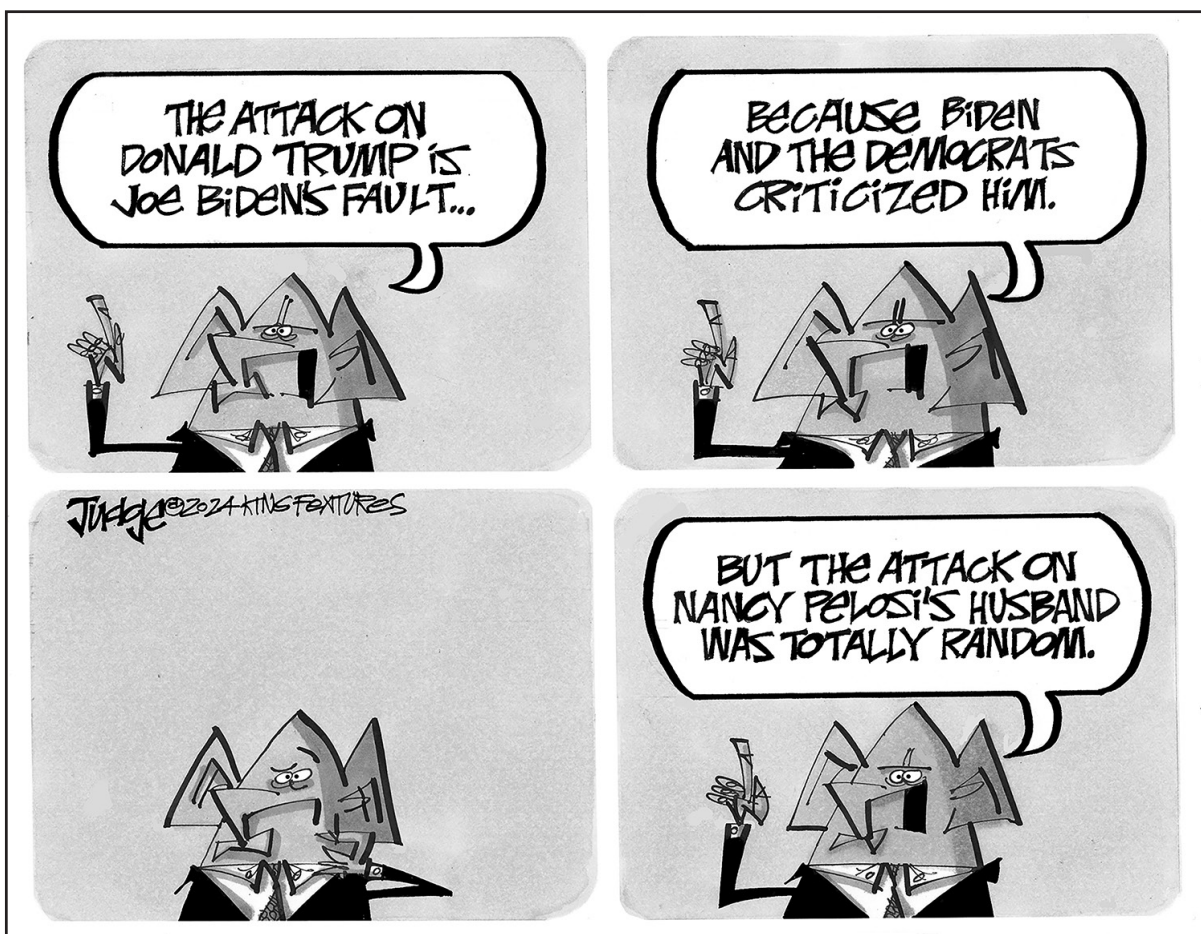
And support the businesses that you see advertising in our pages every week, and let them know you appreciate their support of local media.

The world often seems like a fractured, divisive, and chaotic place when you look at it through the lens of social media. But we all still live in the same place, with the same neighbors. We all want it to be a good place to live, and to raise our children, regardless of our various political leanings and opinions.

This isn't the world of Leave it to Beaver and a 1950s Main Street anymore, and it's never going to be again. But that doesn't mean we can't have a new, vibrant, 21st century Main Street that provides more of what we need right here at home; if we're willing to support it.

manos, on the other hand, was a special event, with all appropriate city permits, permissions, and support. We even checked to make sure after getting your letter. It also ended well before midnight.
Is it frustrating to have fireworks exploding when you want to go to bed, or just enjoy some quiet? Absolutely. As someone who has often had unconventional work schedules, I sympathize with that quest for quiet time.
However, fireworks can only really be appreciated after dark. In the summer however, which is when the July 4 holiday

takes place, the sun sets much later in the day. That means you can't get started until later. It also means a fireworks show is going to last just a little later than some folks bedtime.
It's also going to frighten some animals. That's a perennial complaint. Unmentioned in your letter, but just as important, is the impact on service members suffering with PTSD and trauma responses to explosions.
But it's just one night a year, and we know it's coming. That means that those bothered by it have time to prepare. Whether that means earplugs,

headphones and a favorite podcast, or taking their dogs for a quiet drive in the country. Obviously these won't work for everyone, but you might find you discover another annual ritual that, for you, drives home the importance of community and compromise to keeping this American experiment alive and vibrant.
There is never going to be any solution that makes everyone happy. Cancel the fireworks, and you make some dog owners happy, and disappoint a ton of kids. Continue with them, and folks will continue to complain about the

noise and vibrations. Even if you found a completely silent alternative (some communities are turning to synchronized drone displays), some folks will complain they miss the old fashioned boom that follows the brilliant display – like thunder following lightning.
There is no perfect answer. There is never going to be. But at least it's only one night. (And if it isn't, you can always call the police.)

in the bluegrass festival scene for several years, he explained. Even the name of their festival, Orange Army, comes from being part of a group of volunteers and workers in their bright orange staff shirts.
“There was a group of people that worked for CamFest, and we always wore orange shirts,” Porter explained. One day, as they were all coming over the hill together, for a day of work, one of the promoters told them, “it looks like an orange army coming down through there,” and the name just stuck.
When Sheila was diagnosed with cancer, he said, that same Orange Army came together to help support them through the fight. Once Sheila was in recovery, she wanted to help give back to others in the same way they had been there for her, so the Orange Army Bluegrass Festival was born.
All of the money raised goes directly to cancer patients, Porter explained, to use on whatever they see fit, except medical expenses.
“They’re not allowed to pay a doctor bill with it,” Porter said. “But if they need gas money to get back and forth to treatments, or medicine, or bills, or hotels, whatever, they can have it for that.”
The charity supports the patients with a direct award of \$1,500 per patient.
“The reason we picked that number is we wanted to help more people,” Porter continued. “We could give away \$10,000 to one person, but then we wouldn’t have enough money to help a lot of people. So, we stick with

\$1,500.”
One way they’re funding that is with a \$50,000 raffle drawing on Friday night. Porter explained that they are selling exactly 850 tickets, at \$100 each. After paying off the winner, he said, that leaves the organization with \$35,000 to support cancer patients just from the raffle sales alone. More than 800 of those tickets had been sold at the time of the interview, and Porter said he fully expected them to sell out.
They also want to raise awareness with their events. He said a mobile mammography unit would be set up at the festival, in addition to folks providing information on colon cancer screenings and other cancers.
But the music is the draw, and Porter and the volunteers with the Orange Army intend to do their part to continue making Olive Hill and Carter County synonymous with good music. Moving the festival to the Shriner’s Horse Park is part of that. Folks are already familiar with the venue from the Shriner’s Bluegrass Festival, and the infrastructure is already in place and proven to support the kind of crowds Orange Army draws. The other part is expanding the types of music on offer. Not just by adding more contemporary bluegrass artists, but other genres entirely.
Last weekend, for instance, the organization partnered with Carter County Tourism to bring the first annual Country

on Tygart concert to the park. That free show was preceded by a car show and cornhole tournament in town.
In addition to tourism, Porter and the Orange Army volunteers extended their thanks to all of their sponsors and volunteers – too numerous to name – as well as to Craig’s Auto Sales for sponsoring the car show and Affordable Metal Roofing for sponsoring the cornhole tournament.
These two events, Porter said, are only the beginning. He hopes to someday bring an entire week of musical events to the people of Carter County, highlighting all the wonderful music traditions the region has to offer.
And, raising money for and awareness of cancer. As Porter noted, “You can’t get disability,” with a cancer diagnoses. There are lots of expenses. No energy to work, or even to fill out paperwork for assistance. So, the work the Orange Army does is important, especially to those who benefit from their kindness.
